<p>Immigration seen as a threat to British culture</p> <p>As travelling becomes more affordable, opinions on the impact of / immigration on British society are shifting. A news report and /an opinion piece, published in <i>the Guardian</i> and on <i>HuffpostUK</i> on / September 17th, 2018, respectively, demonstrate balanced perspectives on the matter. Document 3 from / July 2019 in <i>The Conversation</i> highlights generational shifts while a 2018 YouGov / bar chart (doc.4) depicts Britons' views on immigration based on /people's reasons for entering the country. To what extent /does multiculturalism shape public opinion on immigration in the UK? / Division among the population is linked to social divides which / could lead to a debate. (95)</p> <p><u>The British public opinion is strikingly split over immigration.</u> On / the one hand, the four documents reveal Britons have a / positive outlook on multiculturalism considering that it not only enriches / its culture but is also beneficial to its economy. What's more, many British people acknowledge that immigrants may / benefit some sectors such as the NHS (doc. 4). On the / other hand, doc. 1 and 2 point out that 40% of / Britons voice a negative view on immigration, believing that newcomers / alter British culture. Moreover, concerns arise over immigrants taking menial / jobs, leading to fears of salary decreases and perceived threats / to public services—highlighting the divisive nature of the immigration / issue." (111)</p> <p><u>These diverging views are significant of dividing lines within the / British society.</u> Firstly, a generation gap exists regarding the perception / of immigrants. Unlike the older generation, particularly those born just / after WW2, youngsters are more tolerant especially because they are / used to meeting foreign people (doc. 3). For the same reason, / city dwellers tend to be more tolerant than those living / in the countryside (doc. 1). Finally, opinions on newcomers depend on / the assets they may bring socially or economically, those coming / to work for the NHS (doc.2), having high-income skills or / paying to enter a British university being more welcomed than / others (doc 4). (111)</p> <p><u>These contrasting points underline the need to have a debate.</u> /_British society as well as its citizens hold paradoxical views / on immigration. Balancers struggle to take a side (doc. 1), acknowledging / the benefits of some workers while fearing other newcomers may / impose an overwhelming burden on social services. Voters express a / desire for control over immigration, yet, they largely favour the / existing status quo. (doc 3 and 4). To end this continuous / debate and to generalize the improvements suggested in doc. 2, a / national conversation might be needed to help / the population accept the situation and celebrate British culture as/ it is – multicultural. 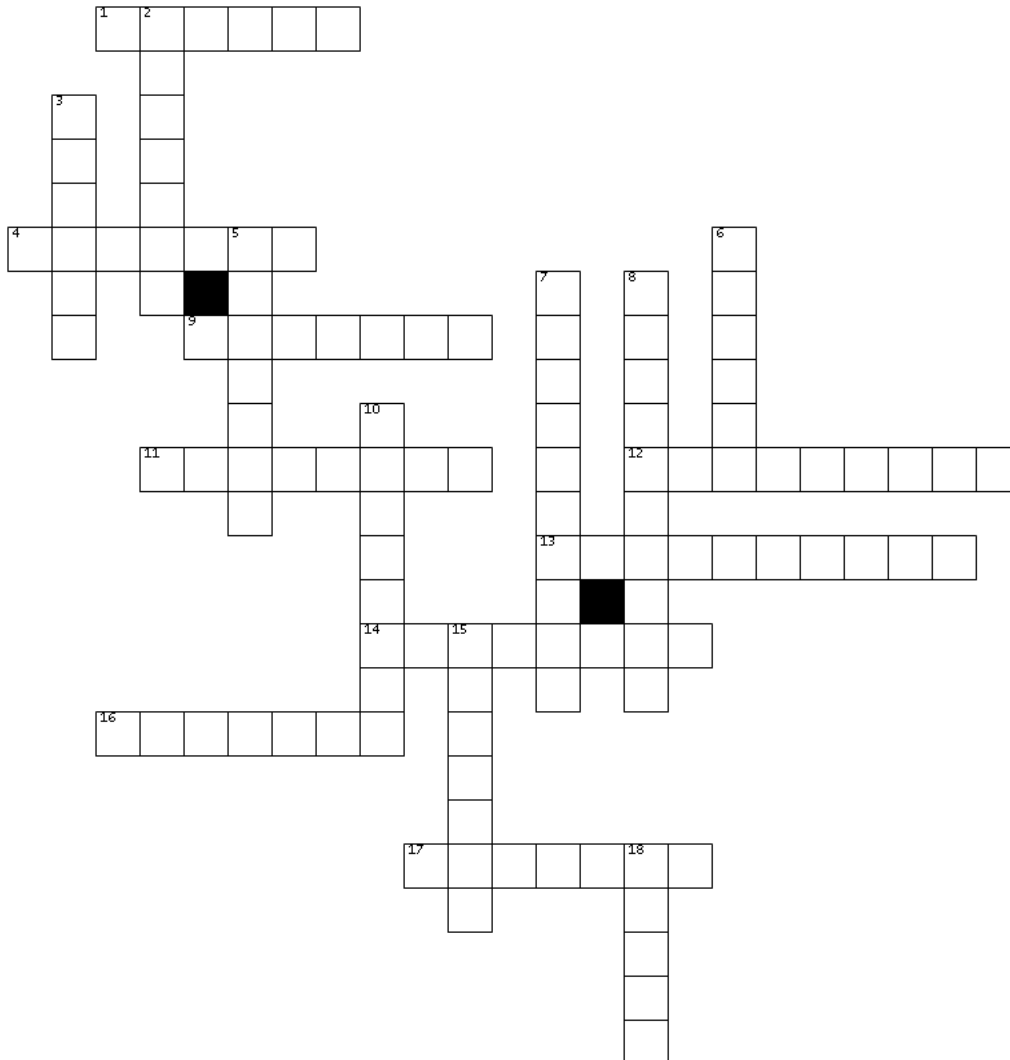

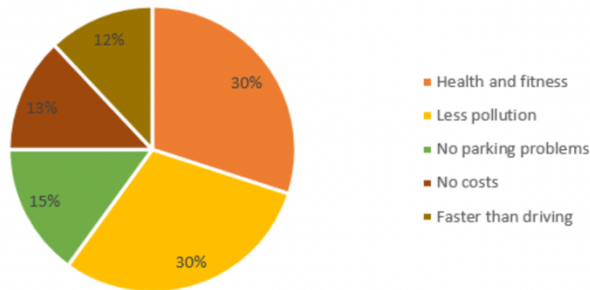

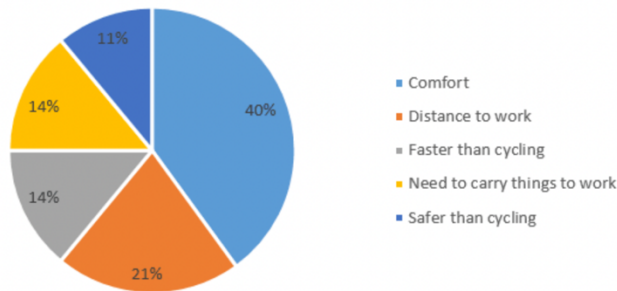
