Every little helps as the saying goes. Yet, to what extent can individual and political measures enable every citizen to have access to drinkable water? This is what the set of documents published in 2022 questions. While the BBC News article (doc.4) depicts the current global environmental situation, the New Statesman (doc. 1) sheds light on various actions taken to address this issue. The Guardian opinion paper (doc. 2) and cartoon (doc. 3) focus on Britain pointing at the overuse of the precious liquid and blaming the water companies. The dossier analyses the situation and highlights temporary and long-lasting solutions.

In today's digitized profit-driven societies, many people turn their backs on libraries, considering them both useless and costly while others struggle to save their public reading spaces. Far from being the obsolete structures N. Lane presents in the 2019 *North Texas Daily* 2019 (doc. 4), and although they may be increasingly neglected financially as D. Grunland illustrates it (doc. 5A), libraries remain essential, argue Smith in her 2018 essay entitled Feel Free (doc. 1), N. Heath in her 2019 Guardian opinion piece (doc. 2), Ann Patchett in her quote (doc. 3), and cartoonist Chris O'Brion (doc. 5B). Then, should states keep financing libraries today? Technology challenges the existence of libraries yet despite their costs they are still considered as attractive. (109)

While The Irish Times article questions the benefits of this new trend, the opinion paper from the commercial website www.audioxide.com and an extract from Backstage Pass essay focus on streaming achievements although alluding to some improvements.
